Charge to the Couple

Inspirational sermon reflecting your hopes and your relationship. I will create this for you based on our conversation addressing the following questions:

4. How did you fall in love (not just how you met, but how your love relationship developed.)
5. Apart from physical chemistry, what do you like most about your fiancé(e)?
6. What difference has it made for you to be together? It might be helpful to think in terms of "before we met..." or "since we've been together...."
7. What is different about being married versus living together?
8. How would you describe a good marriage?

It is very helpful in the preparation of this piece that you share anecdotes and specifics from your life experience together. These specifics will NOT be included but they will help flavor and deepen the words.

The Vows

Vows are the core of the wedding ceremony. They represent the promise you are making to each other. Vows can be traditional or unique. You may create your own or use vows that have been used for centuries. Here are a few examples.

I, ___take you, ___, to be my husband/wife, to have and to hold from this day forward, for better or for worse, for richer or for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, as long as we both shall live.

___, I take you to be my husband/wife, to laugh with you in joy; to grieve with you in sorrow; to grow with you in love; serving humankind in peace and hope; for as long as we both shall live.

___, I want to live with you just as you are. I choose you above all others to share my life with me. I want to love you for yourself in the hope you will become all that you can be. I promise to honor this pledge as long as life and faith endure.

____, I take you as my spouse. I pledge to share my life openly with you, to speak the truth to you in love; I promise to honor and tenderly care for you, to cherish and encourage your own fulfillment as an individual, and our growth together as a couple, through all the changes in our lives.

____, I take you as my spouse. I choose you above all others, to share my life with me. I want to live you just as you are, to laugh with you in joy, to grieve with you in sorrow, to grow with you in love. I pledge to share my life openly with you, to speak the truth to you in love. I promise to honor and tenderly care for you, and I promise to seek peace for ourselves, for our children, and for the world around us. I give myself as I am and as I will be for as long as we both shall live.

____, I take you to be my spouse. I promise to be true to you in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health. I will love you and honor you all the days of my life.

____, I stand beside you today because I choose you above all others. I promise to keep laughing with you and learning with you. I promise to love and cherish you, and to nurture your spirit as I nurture my own. I promise to keep whispering to you late at night, nose to nose. I promise to remind you often of the things I love about you. I promise to speak truthfully to you, and to learn to hold my tongue. I promise to share my feminine spirit with you, so that we grow closer as we get older. I promise to honor the poet in us both. I promise to be faithful to you, and to respect our marriage for as long as I live.

Exchange of Rings

Introduction

These rings are of gold: So may your love for each other be the most precious possession of your lives. Each ring forms a circle: May it symbolize the never-ending loyalty and honor that shall encompass your new relationship.

The circle is a symbol of the sun and the earth and the universe, of wholeness and perfection and peace. May the rings you give and receive this day be symbols of the endless love and unity into which you enter as husband and wife.

Just as these rings are together in my hand, _____ and _____ have pledged to be together as partners in life. Just as these rings are in the shape of a circle that has no end, may they be symbols of a love that knows no end and abides forever.

The wedding ring is a public declaration of commitment. It is an ever visible symbol that these two persons are connected together in love and life.

_____ and _____, these rings symbolize your marriage bond, may their meaning sink into your hearts and bind your lives together by devotion and faithfulness to one another.

Make their life together be a sign of love to those around them, in the hope that that unity may overcome estrangement, forgiveness may heal guilt, and joy may conquer despair.

Give them such fulfillment in their mutual affection that they may reach out in love and concern for others.
